Recent commemorative TV programmes have featured groups of British and German soldiers facing the slaughter and the squalor of the Somme as the seemingly endless stalemate of the First World War created ever-deepening scars across the fields of Flanders. After a particularly heavy British bombardment of the German lines, prior to another planned offensive, soldiers on both sides were shown in prayer to the same God with their respective chaplains. That showed a baffling moment, one of many moments which, added together, create a monumentally difficult challenge given by armed conflict to religion, to faith and to our understanding of ourselves and what motivates us.

For what reasons were prayers being offered to God? On which side was he supposed to be? Would he be able to deliver them — whichever side they were on — from death or injury? Each must have brought before God the supposed rightness of their respective cause that cost so many millions of lives across Europe, the cause for which over 800,000 poppies were placed around the Tower of London in 2014 to commemorate the fallen of this country in that terrible war. How could or would God respond to all their prayers? Could they have been praying for forgiveness for the slaughter they had perpetrated and were about to do so again?

There are those who say that the scale and intensity of death and suffering during the Great War obliterated faith in God for a very large number of people. Our readings for Remembrance Sunday can give us hope: in Micah is the aspiration that nations should not 'learn war any more' and in St John's Gospel is Christ's impassioned appeal for us to abide in his love. Those words offer us a challenge we should make every effort to meet.

Micah 4.1-5

In days to come the mountain of the Lord's house shall be established as the highest of the mountains, and shall be raised up above the hills.

Peoples shall stream to it, and many nations shall come and say: 'Come, let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the house of the God of Jacob; that he may teach us his ways and that we may walk in his paths.' For out of Zion shall go forth instruction, and the word of the Lord from Jerusalem.

He shall judge between many peoples, and shall arbitrate between strong nations far away; they shall beat their swords into ploughshares, and their spears into pruninghooks: nation shall not



lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more; but they shall all sit under their own vines and under their own fig trees, and no one shall make them afraid; for the mouth of the Lord of hosts has spoken.

For all the peoples walk, each in the name of its god, but we will walk in the name of the Lord our God for ever and ever.

John 15.9-17

As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love. If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love. I have said these things to you so that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be complete. This is my commandment, that



you love one another as I have loved you. No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends. You are my friends if you do what I command you.

I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but I have called you friends, because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father. You did not choose me but I chose you. And I appointed you to go and bear fruit, fruit that will last, so that the Father will give you whatever you ask him in my name. I am giving you these commands so that you may love one another.
