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John the Baptist, son of a priest, who lived what we would now call an 'alternative' lifestyle is the last of the great line of prophets to foretell the coming of Christ into the world. Today's Gospel reading begins with a detailed description of the political and religious order of the time which demonstrated brutality and religious corruption. It was into such an order that John was announcing that Christ would come.

John, like Christ, had his wilderness time during which he reflected upon earlier prophets, especially Isaiah, whom he quoted as he (John) prepared people for a different 'coming' from the one that they might have expected. John talks of transformation as absolutely fundamental for humanity, using the imagined smoothing of the physical landscape in which they lived as a metaphor for this transformation – a transformation like no other.

How are things any different now from how they were then? The media relentlessly expose corruption, misdemeanours and the petty jockeying for power of politicians. Life with and through God seems impossible to many. There are still those who don't 'get' the fact that Christ was not, in a conventional sense, a superstar or great political hero. Yet the coming of Christ has demonstrated a whole new phase of his Father's creation. Christ lived as a human being. He experienced many of the tribulations that are found in human life. He never said that our lives would be easy but, to those of faith he is experienced in us and through us and the living of our daily lives. The message that John brought is that if we consciously live in Christ then he will always be there to meet us.

Reading

Baruch 5.1-9

Take off the garment of your sorrow and affliction, O Jerusalem, and put on for ever the beauty of the glory from God. Put on the

robe of the righteousness that comes from God; put on your head the diadem of the glory of the Everlasting; for God will show your



splendour everywhere under heaven. For God will give you evermore the name, 'Righteous Peace, Godly Glory'.

Arise, O Jerusalem, stand upon the height; look towards the east, and see your children gathered from west and east at the word of the Holy One, rejoicing that God has remembered them. For they went out from you on foot, led away by their enemies; but God will bring them back to you, carried in glory, as on a royal throne. For God has ordered that every high mountain and the everlasting hills be made low and the valleys filled up, to make level ground, so that Israel may walk safely in the glory of God. The woods and every fragrant tree have shaded Israel at God's command. For God will lead Israel with joy, in the light of his glory, with the mercy and righteousness that come from him.

Canticle Benedictus

Blessed be the Lord God of Israel for he hath visited, and redeemed his people;
And hath raised up a mighty salvation for us in the house of his servant David;
As he spake by the mouth of his holy Prophets which have been since the world began;

That we should be saved from our enemies and from the hands of all that hate us;
To perform the mercy promised to our forefathers and to remember his holy covenant;

Gospel Luke 3.1-6

In the fifteenth year of the reign of Emperor Tiberius, when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, and Herod was ruler of Galilee, and his brother Philip ruler of the region of Ituraea and Trachonitis, and Lysanias ruler of Abilene, during the high-priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John son of Zechariah in the wilderness. He went

into all the region around the Jordan, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins, as it is written in the book of the words of the prophet Isaiah, 'The voice of one crying out in the wilderness:

"Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight. Every valley shall be filled, and every mountain and hill shall be made low, and the crooked shall be made straight, and the rough ways made smooth; and all flesh shall see the salvation of God."

Father in heaven, who sent your Son to redeem the world and will send him again to be our judge: give us grace so to imitate him in the humility and purity of his first coming that, when he comes again, we may be ready to greet him with joyful love and firm faith; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen**




