This Gospel reading covers a lot of ground and forms part of a longer sequence in St Luke's Gospel in which Christ is exploring with his disciples and wider audiences our relationship with God and its implications for everyday life on earth. Encountering the statement "...it is God's pleasure to give you the kingdom' sets the tone and the intention is a wonderful promise that relates not only to the qualities of heaven but to the qualities of unconditional, loving generosity that will help to enrich life on earth. These often conflict with the values of society which frequently suggest that the accumulation of wealth is its highest goal and good. Security which is supposedly derived from the accumulation of wealth is not comparable to the security that comes from love, care and support for the needy and undiminished hope in an eternal future. These aspects of God's reality can spread from his heavenly kingdom to earth if we would work towards such a goal, as many people of faith do. This requires us to be vigilant in relation to the secular pressures that can overwhelm us and this advice forms the final part of our Gospel reading. The imagery may relate to the society of the time, but the advice is at least as relevant to us today as pressures assault us in all dimensions: body, mind and spirit. God will find us, sometimes when we are least expecting it, and to acknowledge his presence in us through Christ's gift of the Holy Spirit is one of the most remarkable things that can happen to us.

Reading Genesis 15.1-6

After these things the word of the Lord came to Abram in a vision, 'Do not be afraid, Abram, I am your shield; your reward shall be very great.' But Abram said, 'O Lord God, what will you give me, for I continue childless, and the heir of my house is Eliezer of Damascus?' And Abram said, 'You have given me no offspring, and so a slave born in my house is to be my heir.' But the word of the Lord came to him, 'This man shall not be your heir; no one but your very own issue shall be your heir.' He brought him outside and said, 'Look towards heaven and count the



stars, if you are able to count them.' Then he said to him, 'So shall your descendants be.' And he believed the Lord; and the Lord reckoned it to him as righteousness.

Psalm Psalm 33.12-end

Happy is the nation whose God is the Lord, the people whom he has chosen as his heritage.

The Lord looks down from heaven; he sees all humankind. From where he sits enthroned he watches all the inhabitants of the earth - he who fashions the hearts of them all, and observes all their deeds. A king is not saved by his great army; a warrior is not delivered by his great strength. The war horse is a vain hope for victory, and by its great might it cannot save.

Truly the eye of the Lord is on those who fear him, on those who hope in his steadfast

love, to deliver their soul from death, and to keep them alive in famine.
Our soul waits for the Lord; he is our help and shield. Our heart is glad in



him, because we trust in his holy name. Let your steadfast love, O Lord, be upon us, even as we hope in you.

Reading Hebrews 11.1-3,8-16

Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. Indeed, by faith our ancestors received approval. By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was made from things that are not visible.

By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to set out for a place that he was to receive as an inheritance; and he set out, not knowing where he was going. By faith he stayed for a time in the land he had been promised, as in a foreign land, living in tents, as did Isaac and lacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. For he looked forward to the city that has foundations, whose architect and builder is God. By faith he received power of procreation, even though he was too old and Sarah herself was barren - because he considered him faithful who had promised. Therefore from one person, and this one as good as dead, descendants were born, 'as many as the stars of heaven and as the innumerable grains of sand by the seashore.' All of these died in faith without having received the promises, but from a distance they saw and greeted them. They confessed that they were strangers and foreigners on the earth, for people who speak in this way make it clear that they are seeking a homeland. If they had been thinking of the land that they had left behind, they would have had opportunity to return. But as it is, they desire a better country, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God; indeed, he has prepared a city for them.

Gospel Luke 12.32-40

'Do not be afraid, little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom. Sell your possessions, and give alms. Make purses for yourselves that do not wear out, an unfailing treasure in heaven, where no thief comes near and no moth destroys. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.



'Be dressed for action and have your lamps lit; be like those who are waiting for their master to return from the wedding banquet, so that they may open the door for him as soon as he

comes and knocks. Blessed are those slaves whom the master finds alert when he comes; truly I tell you, he will fasten his belt and have them sit down to eat, and he will come and serve them. If he comes during the middle of the night, or near dawn, and finds them so, blessed are those slaves.

'But know this: if the owner of the house had known at what hour the thief was coming, he would not have let his house be broken into. You also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an unexpected hour.'

Strengthen for service, Lord, the hands that have taken holy things; may the ears which have heard your word be deaf to clamour and dispute; may the tongues which have sung your praise be free from deceit; may the eyes which have seen the tokens of your love shine with the light of hope; and may the bodies which have been fed with your body be refreshed with the fullness of your life; glory to you for ever. **Amen**
