He prayed about it, studied maps and ancient texts for many years until, at last, the abbot gave him permission to leave the monastery for one year. Thus he was free to walk to the Holy Land, pray at the sacred sites and walk around the hallowed walls. When the day of his release arrived he set off with enthusiasm down the hill from the monastery, staff in hand, his bag on his back.

He had not travelled far before he met a man sitting by the road who told the monk he and his family were starving and that he was almost too weak now to continue begging for those he loved most. The monk knelt down with the man and prayed and then startled him by walking around him three times before emptying his purse and giving the man his cloak. Then the monk turned and headed back to his monastery where the brothers were amazed to see him. Why had he come back? Had he forgotten something? 'Yes, 'replied the monk, 'but now I have been to the Holy Land. Jerusalem was brought to me.'

And the tellers of this story end by saying the monk then had a vision in which Jesus appeared and told him he had been the beggar sitting on the side of the road. But then we knew that already, didn't we?

What this story doesn't record is the internal anguish of the monk as he knelt and prayed besides the man on the side of the road. Remember his pilgrimage had been years and years in the planning and yearning and here he was confronted with something so clear in its demands, so simple in its expectation. To change his plan must have seemed almost unbearable had it not been for his certainty that his Lord wished him to do so.

It is so very demanding and painful for us not to be able to be together as Easter, the Queen of Seasons, begins and the joy of the Resurrection bursts forth after a long and taxing Lent. The eighth-century Greek poet and theologian John of Damascus wrote:

Now the queen of seasons, bright With the day of splendour, With the royal feast of feasts, Comes its joy to render; Comes to glad Jerusalem, Who with true affection Welcomes in unwearied strains Jesu's resurrection.

In our context, we are 'glad Jerusalem' wherever we are and whatever our circumstance is at present. No restriction or deprivation can diminish for us the promise or reality of resurrection life.

There's a parallel in another story, told many years ago now, at the height of Soviet power, when the regime in Russia worked hard to obliterate the Christian faith and to persuade the people not just of the inherent rightness and logic of atheistic Communism but specifically of the illogical naivety of the 'Christian myth', an old wives tale that was best consigned to the scrap heap of history, in order to free the people of superstition and enable them to embrace the truth of the new ideology.

At one village meeting, after the local commissar had been haranguing the folk for a good hour and a half, he came to a triumphant conclusion of unimpeachable logic and argument and sat down.

Convinced he had won the day and persuaded the rather impassive crowd of country folk before him; were there any questions, he asked, anything anyone wished to say? After a moment, finally, one old villager rose to his feet and in clear voice proclaimed: 'Alleluia. Christ is risen!' And with one voice the villagers responded, 'He is risen indeed. Alleluia!'

This simple yet passionate response, is the Christian answer to those who say the end of life is death and nothingness. We say after death comes resurrection life. If it were not so, Jesus' death would not only have been the end for him, his story would have no substance, no impetus, no real impact, no future and would have ended in obscurity some 2000 years ago, And we would have no hope now. Whereas, with all who are with us but separated from us, by distance or time, we boldly proclaim the great triumph of love:

Alleluia. Christ is risen! He is risen indeed. Alleluia!

Reading Acts 10.34-43

Then Peter began to speak to them: 'I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but

in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ - he is Lord of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name.'

Psalm *Psalm* 118.14-24

The Lord is my strength and my might; he has become my salvation.

There are glad songs of victory in the tents of the righteous: 'The right hand of the Lord does valiantly; the right hand of the Lord is exalted; the right hand of the Lord does valiantly.' I shall not die, but I shall live, and recount the deeds of the Lord. The Lord has punished me severely, but he did not give me over to death.

Open to me the gates of righteousness, that I may enter through them and give thanks to the Lord.

This is the gate of the Lord; the righteous shall enter through it.

I thank you that you have answered me and have become my salvation. The stone that the



builders rejected has become the chief cornerstone. This is the Lord's doing; it is marvellous in our eyes. This is the day that the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it.

Reading Colossians 3.1-4

So if you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is,

seated at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth, for you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in



God. When Christ who is your life is revealed, then you also will be revealed with him in glory.

Gospel John 20.1-18

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, 'They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid



him.' Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went towards the tomb. The two were

running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, and the cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead. Then the disciples returned to their homes.

But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. They said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping?' She said to them, 'They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him.' When she had said this, she turned round and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping? For whom are you looking?' Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, 'Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away.' Jesus said to her, 'Mary!' She turned and said to him in Hebrew, 'Rabbouni!' (which means Teacher). Jesus said to her, 'Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, "I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, 'I have seen the Lord'; and she told them that he had said these things to her.

St Barnabas' Refurbishment Project

As already reported, a grant of £10,000 has been received from the Lottery Community Fund. A conditional offer of £2,500 has also come from The Beatrice Laing Trust (this will be available once we have a starting date for the Project and other funding in place). We have also just been informed that The Gatwick Foundation Fund of the Sussex Community Foundation are donating £5,000 to the Project.

The Pastoral Centre was nominated for the Asda Foundation Green Token Giving scheme, due to feature on the Community Board at Asda, Crawley, during the next vote to begin on I April. This has now been delayed due to the coronavirus. Further details to follow. This is all good news for St Barnabas' but more funding is needed before our Project can go ahead.


