# Sunday 14 June 2020 Trinity I

Genesis 18.1-15 Psalm 116.1,10-17 Romans 5.1-8 Matthew 9.35-10.8



Please send pew sheet notices to pewsheet@worthparish.org or phone 0300 111 8150 'Preach the Gospel at all times, and if necessary use words.' This saying is popularly attributed to St Francis of Assisi and, whether or not he did actually say it, it does enrich our understanding of Matthew 28.19 and Jesus' exhortation to his followers to 'Go therefore and make disciples of all nations' by reminding us that actions often speak more clearly than words.

In the early chapters of the Sermon on the Mount, (Matthew chapters five to seven) Jesus rather ambitiously exhorts his hearers to 'Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect. 'This comes after various teachings that contradict human experience and inclination. Jesus was under no illusion as to the frailty of human nature, nor to the extent of our stubbornness and stupidity but nor did he, does he, give up on us and holds before us the ideal, perhaps not of perfection but of completeness, wholeness, of being at peace with ourselves, with one another and with God.

The Greek word koinonia reflects something of the nature of the Trinity in the life of the Church. In the New Testament it is translated in various places as 'fellowship', 'sharing',' participation', 'communion' but all our English words are too pale and weak to express the richness and depth of what it means. The inner and outer unity of the church is the object and aim of living in koinonia. In fact, you could say, without koinonia there is no church. And reflecting the nature of God, koinonia is an experience of fellowship that draws in and includes. We like to the think of the church, the fellowship of

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believers, as a family and that's a good metaphor because it reminds us that our place within it is something given, not earned or taken.

'Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.' And this is what we do; baptizing all, or any, who ask. We baptize into a fellowship, into a family, into a relationship that reflects the life of God; into koinonia. St Paul as he ends his second letter to the Christians in Corinth, encourages them to 'agree with one another, live in peace; and the God of love and peace will be with you. Greet one another with a holy kiss. All the saints greet you. The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with all of you.'

Being in fellowship is more challenging than merely belonging, as in belonging to club, for example. Where a church thinks and acts like a club, operating solely for the benefit of its members, it becomes exclusive and excluding and the very antithesis of living in koinonia. It's all very well for Groucho Marx to refuse to join any club that would accept him as a member but it can, sadly, happen where a new person joins a church congregation only to feel themselves judged, found wanting, and very much on the outside. And when that happens, surely it is the church community not that individual that actually is being judged and found wanting. 'Koinonia, 'as one writer puts it, 'creates a brethren bond which builds trust and, especially when combined with the values of Wisdom, Virtue and Honour, overcomes two of humanity's deepest fears and insecurities: being betrayed and being demeaned'

The *koinonia* of the church at its best and at its strongest overcomes many fears and insecurities by encouragement, compassion and care. When this lockdown is finally over and we are free to gather once again in our beloved church buildings, free to resume daily life, my prayer is that we pick up not from where we were, or thought we were, but where we had always

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hoped to be, intended to be, where the Lord wants us to be. If by our patience and positivity we encourage others to be kinder and more considerate, we will indeed be living as people who 'Preach the Gospel at all times, and if necessary use words.'

Reading Isaiah 40.12-17,27-end

Who has measured the waters in the hollow of his hand and marked off the heavens with a span, enclosed the dust of the earth in a measure, and weighed the mountains in scales and the hills in a balance? Who has directed the spirit of the Lord, or as his counsellor has instructed him? Whom did he consult for his enlightenment, and who taught him the path of justice? Who taught him knowledge, and showed him the way of understanding? Even the nations are like a drop from a bucket, and are accounted as dust on the scales; see, he takes up the isles like fine dust. Lebanon would not provide fuel enough, nor are its animals enough for a burnt-offering. All the nations are as nothing before him; they are accounted by him as less than nothing and emptiness.



Why do you say, O Jacob, and speak, O Israel, 'My way is hidden from the Lord, and my right is disregarded by my God? Have you not known? Have you not heard? The Lord is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth. He does not faint or grow weary; his understanding is unsearchable. He gives power to the faint, and strengthens the powerless. Even youths will faint and be weary, and the young will fall exhausted; but those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint.

Yet you have made them a little lower than God, and crowned them with glory and honour. You have given them dominion over the works of your hands; you have put all things under their feet, all sheep and oxen, and also the beasts of the field, the birds of the air, and the fish of the sea, whatever passes along the paths of the seas.

O Lord, our Sovereign, how majestic is your name in all the earth!

**Reading** 2 Corinthians 13.11-end Finally, brothers and sisters, farewell. Put things in order, listen to my appeal, agree with one another, live in peace; and the God of love and peace will be with you. Greet one another with a holy kiss. All the saints greet you.

## Gospel Matthew 28.16-20

Now the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain to which Jesus had directed them. When they saw him, they worshipped him; but some doubted. And Jesus came and said to them, 'All authority in heaven and on

earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to



obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age.'




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
