The problem in this week's Gospel parable is that the man portrayed by Jesus thinks only of himself. He was rich, and God had blessed his harvest to the extent that he became richer. The issue was about stewardship, what to do with his wealth - and the responsibility of using wisely the gifts that he had.

The farmer talks with no-one but himself. No mention here of family or community – and he certainly hasn't asked God for guidance as to what he should do with his riches!

In 2006 I spent my sabbatical in Pennsylvania, studying the Amish Community - having, on previous visits, come across them. Two of the lovely things I learned about the Amish communities. which now exist mainly in the USA, is their simplicity of life and their sharing of wealth; the members are fully aware that all that they have comes from God. Although members live in individual homes and work separately either on farms or in local industry, they meet regularly for worship and social occasions - so that they learn about, and can meet the needs of fellow members who may be struggling; and not necessarily about money.

In the UK, and in several countries, the Bruderhof communities, who live together in communities of about 300 members, do the same. Both groups are aware of their utter dependence on God for everything they have – and share anything they don't need with their neighbourhood and charities.

You and I need to be increasingly aware that we should become 'rich towards God' (v.21). If we accumulate wealth just for ourselves, with no concern under God's guidance for helping others— that's disastrous... When we die, we will face God empty-handed - because our riches will not carry over into eternity.

Reading *Ecclesiastes 1.2,12-14; 2.18-23* Vanity of vanities, says the Teacher, vanity of vanities! All is vanity.



I, the Teacher, when king over Israel in Jerusalem, applied my mind

to seek and to search out by wisdom all that is done under heaven; it is an unhappy business that God has given to human beings to be busy with. I saw all the deeds that are done under the sun; and see, all is vanity and a chasing after wind.

I hated all my toil in which I had toiled under the sun, seeing that I must leave it to those who come after me - and who knows whether they will be wise or foolish? Yet they will be master of all for which I toiled and used my wisdom under the sun. This also is vanity. So I turned and gave my heart up to despair concerning all the toil of my labours under the sun, because sometimes one who has toiled with wisdom and knowledge and skill must leave all to be enjoyed by another who did not toil for it. This also is vanity and a great evil. What do mortals get from all the toil and strain with which they toil under the sun? For all their days are full of pain, and their work is a vexation; even at night their minds do not rest. This also is vanity.

Psalm *Psalm* 49.1-9

Hear this, all you peoples; give ear, all inhabitants of the world, both low and



high, rich and poor together. My mouth shall speak wisdom; the meditation of my heart shall be understanding. I will incline my ear to

a proverb; I will solve my riddle to the music of the harp.

Why should I fear in times of trouble, when the iniquity of my persecutors surrounds me, those who trust in their wealth and boast of the abundance of their riches? Truly, no ransom avails for one's life, there is no price one can give to God for it. For the ransom of life is costly, and can never suffice, that one should live on for ever and never see the grave.

Reading Colossians 3.1-11

So if you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your



minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth, for you have died, and your life is

hidden with Christ in God. When Christ who is your life is revealed, then you also will be revealed with him in glory.

Put to death, therefore, whatever in you is earthly: fornication, impurity, passion, evil desire, and greed (which is idolatry). On account of these the wrath of God is coming on those who are disobedient. These are the ways you also once followed, when you were living that life. But now you must get rid of all such things - anger, wrath, malice, slander, and abusive language from your mouth. Do not lie to one another, seeing that you have stripped off the old self with its practices and have clothed yourselves with the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge according to the image of its creator. In that renewal there is no longer Greek and lew, circumcised and uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave and free; but Christ is all and in all!

Gospel Luke 12.13-21

Someone in the crowd said to him, 'Teacher, tell my brother to divide the family inheritance with me.' But he said to him, 'Friend, who set me to be a judge or arbitrator over you?' And he said to them,

'Take care! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; for one's life does not consist in the abundance of possessions.' Then he told them



a parable: 'The land of a rich man produced abundantly. And he thought to himself, "What should I do, for

I have no place to store my crops?" Then he said, "I will do this: I will pull down my barns and build larger ones, and there I will store all my grain and my goods. And I will say to my soul, Soul, you have ample goods laid up for many years; relax, eat, drink, be merry." But God said to him, "You fool! This very night your life is being demanded of you. And the things you have prepared, whose will they be?" So it is with those who store up treasures for themselves but are not rich towards God.'

Lord God, whose Son is the true vine and the source of life, ever giving himself that the world may live: may we so receive within ourselves the power of his death and passion that, in his saving cup, we may share his glory and be made perfect in his love; for he is alive and reigns, now and for ever.
