One of the joys, but perhaps one of the stresses of impending parenthood, is trying to decide the name of the baby. While parents often have free choice, sometimes there are conventions to follow. And sometimes the name is decreed by the family. Mary and Joseph had no choice in deciding what their new baby would be called. In today's Gospel passage we hear about the Angel appearing to Joseph in a dream. 'She will bear a son and you are to name him Jesus'. Yet further on in the passage we read 'Look, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son and they shall name him Emmanuel'. One Gospel passage but two names! Is there a conflict? Of course, many people are known by more than one name: quite often the second moniker is used to distinguish between people of the same name e.g. Big John and Little John. Jesus was a very common name two thousand years ago. It means 'God saves'. The meaning of Emmanuel is 'God with us'.

Last Sunday during a joyful (and chocolatefilled) 'Carols for All' service at St Barnabas' we sang 'Hark the Herald Angels Sing'. Amongst the lyrics are the words 'Christ, the everlasting Lord'; 'Hail the Incarnate Deity'; 'Hail, the Heaven-born Prince of Peace!'; 'Hail the Son of Righteousness'. There are many names that we can use for Jesus, and at the heart of all of these wondrous names is Emmanuel 'God with us'. God with us, incarnate in the newborn babe lying in the manger. God with us... right now and at all times and in all places. God with us beyond the manger in the stable to be part of our lives on Christmas Day and throughout the year to come. God with us, ALWAYS. Amen.

Paul, a servant of Jesus Christ, called to be an apostle, set apart for the gospel of God, which he

promised beforehand through his prophets in the holy scriptures, the gospel concerning his Son, who was descended from David according to the flesh and was declared to be Son of God with power according to the spirit of holiness by resurrection from the dead, Jesus Christ our Lord, through whom we have received grace and apostleship to bring about the obedience of faith among all the Gentiles for the sake of his name, including yourselves who are called to belong to Jesus Christ,

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

Gospel Matthew 1.18-25

Now the birth of Jesus the Messiah took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been engaged to Joseph, but before they lived together, she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, planned to dismiss her quietly. But just when he had resolved to do this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will bear a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people

from their sins.' All this took place to fulfil what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet: 'Look, the virgin shall conceive



and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel', which means, 'God is with us.' When Joseph awoke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him; he took her as his wife, but had no marital relations with her until she had borne a son; and he named him Jesus.
