A vineyard is established by a landowner. He engages tenants to look after it and ensure that it is productive. When he sends his representatives to collect the wine they are attacked and one is killed.

As we reflected upon last week, God created our earth and wishes to see it tenanted productively with love, with compassion. We have managed over the millennia to disfigure it with our insecurities, our greed, our jealous conflict and our short-term perspective on things.

The landowner finally sends his son to the vineyard. He too is killed and the tenants expect to inherit the vineyard. The consequence of that is nothing but grief. All those who allow greed and enmity to rule their lives alienate themselves from God and those who possess little or nothing receive value, and an inheritance from God.

This parable should resonate with us in various ways. It is a wonderful metaphor for the life - and death - of Christ. Suspicion, misunderstanding and political insecurity led to his death on the cross.

Those who lead us, who organise in so many different national and international ways, our tenanting of the earth, seem all too frequently motivated by quite selfish and dishonourable impulses. In Britain we are in the midst of the annual round of political party conferences. What feelings are aroused in us by the political rhetoric that is broadcast from them? A number of those who might have really significant and positive contributions to bring to our national life are drowned out by the soundbites and the showmanship that seem to be an essential part of conference life. When and how will God-given values be enabled to infuse our earthly stewardship?

Reading Isaiah 5.1-7

Let me sing for my beloved my love-song concerning his vineyard: My beloved had a vineyard on a very fertile hill. He dug it and cleared it of stones, and planted it with choice vines; he built a watch-tower in the midst of it, and hewed out a wine vat in it; he expected it to yield grapes, but it yielded wild grapes.

And now, inhabitants of Jerusalem and people of Judah, judge between me and my vineyard. What more was there to do for my vineyard



that I have not done in it? When I expected it to yield grapes, why did it yield wild grapes?

And now I will tell you what I will do to my vineyard. I will remove its hedge, and it shall be devoured; I will break down

its wall, and it shall be trampled down. I will make it a waste; it shall not be pruned or hoed, and it shall be overgrown with briers and thorns; I will also command the clouds that they rain no rain upon it.

For the vineyard of the Lord of hosts is the house of Israel, and the people of Judah are his pleasant planting; he expected justice, but saw bloodshed; righteousness, but heard a cry!

Reading Philippians 3.4b-14

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless. Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. More than that, I regard everything as loss because

of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but one that comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God based on faith. I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by becoming like him in his death, if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead. Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ lesus has made me his own. Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but this one thing

I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on towards the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ lesus.



Gospel Matthew 21.33-46

'Listen to another parable. There was a landowner who planted a vineyard, put a fence around it, dug a wine press in it, and built a watch-tower. Then he leased it to tenants and went to another country. When the harvest time had come, he sent his slaves to the tenants to collect his produce. But the tenants seized his slaves and beat one, killed another, and stoned another. Again he sent other slaves, more than the first; and they treated them in the same way. Finally he sent his son to them, saying, "They will respect my son." But when the tenants saw the son, they said to themselves, "This is the heir; come, let us kill him and get his inheritance." So they seized him, threw him out of the vineyard, and killed him. Now when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?' They said to him, 'He will put those wretches to a miserable death, and lease the

vineyard to other tenants who will give him the produce at the harvest time.'

Jesus said to them, 'Have you never read in



the scriptures: "The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone; this was the Lord's doing, and it is amazing in

our eyes"? Therefore I tell you, the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people that produces the fruits of the kingdom. The one who falls on this stone will be broken to pieces; and it will crush anyone on whom it falls.'

When the chief priests and the Pharisees heard his parables, they realized that he was speaking about them. They wanted to arrest him, but they feared the crowds, because they regarded him as a prophet.

We praise and thank you, O Christ, for this sacred feast: for here we receive you, here the memory of your passion is renewed, here our minds are filled with grace, and here a pledge of future glory is given, when we shall feast at that table where you reign with all your saints for ever. **Amen**
