In our Gospel passage today, Jesus uses animal metaphors, that of a fox and of a hen. He refers to Herod Antipas as a fox. In the ancient world, particularly in Jewish culture, calling someone a fox was an insult; foxes were seen as cunning, deceitful, and destructive... but also weak.

So, Jesus calling Herod 'a fox' was a way of mocking his cunning but ultimately weak nature. It emphasizes the fact that Herod's threats would not stop God's plan, and it reinforces Jesus' authority and divine purpose. In contrast, Jesus refers to Himself as a hen: "How often I desired to gather your children together, as a hen gathers her brood under her wings".

The hen metaphor contrasts sharply with the fox metaphor used for Herod. While the fox symbolises cunning, destruction, and self-interest, the hen represents protection, nurturing, and self-sacrificial love.

So, Jesus paints a vivid picture: The fox preys on the hen and her chicks, but the hen still gathers her young, willing to die to protect them. This is a foreshadowing of the cross, where Jesus would lay down His life to save those who would come to Him.

The imagery of a hen protecting her brood with her wings enables us to feel that same protection; that same sense of safety of being in the shadow of His wings. But in order to be protected by those wings we need to move in tandem with them and match our footsteps to walk with Christ along the path of life - not to go our own way and do our own thing, but to stay as close to Him as we can.

So, during Lent, by spending time reflecting on our own lives, our own missions, and our own relationships with God, we can grow more mindful of His presence in our lives, knowing that we are safely under the shadow of His wings.



Reading Genesis 15.1-12, 17-18

After these things the word of the Lord came to Abram in a vision, 'Do not be afraid, Abram, I am your shield; your reward shall be very great.' But Abram said, 'O Lord God, what will you give me, for I continue childless, and the heir of my house is Eliezer of Damascus?' And Abram said, 'You have given me no offspring, and so a slave born in my house is to be my heir.' But the word of the Lord came to him, 'This man shall not be your heir; no one but your very own issue shall be your heir.' He brought him outside and said, 'Look towards heaven and count the stars, if you are able to count them.' Then he said to him, 'So shall your descendants be.' And he believed the Lord; and the Lord reckoned it to him as righteousness.

Then he said to him, 'I am the Lord who brought you from Ur of the Chaldeans, to give you this land to possess.' But he said, 'O Lord, how am I to know that I shall possess it?' He said to him, 'Bring me a heifer three years old, a female goat three years old, a ram three years old, a turtle-dove, and a young pigeon.' He brought him all these and cut them in two, laying each half over against the other; but he did not cut the birds in two. And when birds of prey came down on the carcasses, Abram drove them away.

As the sun was going down, a deep sleep fell upon Abram, and a deep and terrifying darkness descended upon him.



When the sun had gone down and it was dark, a smoking firepot and a flaming torch passed

between these pieces. On that day the Lord made a covenant with Abram, saying, 'To your descendants I give this land, from the river of Egypt to the great river, the river Euphrates.'


Reading Philippians 3.17-4.1

Brothers and sisters join in imitating



me, and observe those who live according to the example you have in us. For many live as enemies of the cross of Christ; I have often told you of them, and now I tell you even with tears. Their end is destruction; their god is the belly; and their glory is in their shame; their minds are set on earthly things. But our citizenship is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Saviour, the Lord Jesus Christ. He will transform the body of our humiliation so that it may be conformed to the body of his glory, by the power that also enables him to make all things subject to himself. Therefore, my brothers and sisters, whom I love and long for, my joy and crown, stand firm in the Lord in this way, my beloved.

Gospel Luke 13.31-35



At that very hour some Pharisees came and said to him, 'Get away from here, for Herod wants to kill you. He said to them, 'Go and tell that fox for me, "Listen, I am casting out demons and performing cures today and tomorrow, and on the third day I finish my work. Yet today, tomorrow, and the next day I must be on my way, because it is impossible for a prophet to be killed away from Jerusalem." Jerusalem, Jerusalem, the city that kills the prophets and stones those who are sent to it! How often have I desired to gather your children together as a hen gathers her brood under her wings, and you were not willing! See, your house is left to you. And I tell you, you will not see me until

the time comes when you say, “Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord.”

Almighty God, you see that we have no power of ourselves to help ourselves: keep us both outwardly in our bodies, and inwardly in our souls; that we may be defended from all adversities which may happen to the body, and from all evil thoughts which may assault and hurt the soul; through Jesus Christ our Lord.
